These experiences are now fusing with the launch of the Health Design Lab at the new Li Ka Shing Knowledge Institute where Dr. Evans is leading a "collaboratory" to revolutionize the way people make health decisions. By bringing together media companies, designers, filmmakers, expert patients, policy makers, researchers, marketers, and clinicians, the Health Design Lab will create and evaluate knowledge therapy. Participants will learn how web 2.0 makes a difference, how stories trump data, AND, how relationships trump stories.
